

SPORT FISHING



Seasons

HOOK AND LINE—Open entire year throughout state except as noted in "Special Areas" section.

ARCHERY AND SPEARING—(game and non-game fish) April 1 to December 1, sunrise to sunset, except as noted in "Special Areas" section.

SNAGGING—November 1 to April 1 only in the Missouri River. All other waters of state are closed.

BAG AND POSSESSION LIMITS—Any fish caught that is not to be counted in the bag limit must be immediately released into the water with as little injury as possible. Any fish placed on a stringer, or in a container, or not returned immediately to the water, must be counted in the bag, except in Two Rivers Recreation Area Lake No. 5, every fish caught must be counted in the angler's bag limit.

SPECIAL LIMITS—In the following state-owned lakes the daily bag and possession limit is 10 fish, either game, non-game, or both: All Two Rivers Lakes, Douglas County; Niobrara Park Lake, Knox County; Lake No. 1A (NE) Louisville, Cass County; State Lakes, Jefferson County; Dead Timber Lake, Dodge County; Hord Lake, Merrick County; Crystal Lake, Adams County; Memphis Lake, Saunders County; Victoria Springs Park Lake, Custer County; Fremont Carp Lake, Dodge County; and all "put and take" lakes stocked by the Game Commission unless otherwise provided by special regulations. **There is no open season on flathead (yellow) catfish in Burchard State Lake, Pawnee County.**

****DAILY BAG**—Fish taken from midnight to midnight.

*****POSSESSION LIMIT**—Fish in a person's portable cooler, home freezer, registered in his name in a commercial cold storage locker, or in any other way under his control.

Size Limits

NORTHERN PIKE—24 inches only in that part of Nebraska east of U.S. Highway 81. This excludes the waters of the Missouri River and its oxbows.

ALL OTHER SPECIES—None.

RESIDENT FISHING PERMIT: Required of all residents 16 years of age or older.

NONRESIDENT FISHING PERMIT: Required of all persons who are not residents of Nebraska, except those under 16 years of age accompanied by a parent or guardian possessing a valid nonresident permit.

RESIDENT: A person who has resided in Nebraska continuously for at least 90 days and who has a bonafide intention of becoming a legal resident of this state. Members of the armed forces on active duty and officially stationed in Nebraska may purchase a resident fishing permit after residing 30 consecutive days in the state.

BOUNDARY WATERS: See permit requirements for persons fishing in any waters of Lewis and Clark Lake and the Missouri River under "Special Areas—Boundary Waters".

NOTICE: This publication is meant as a guide only. For official law see Revised Statutes of Nebraska.

IF YOU CATCH A RECORD FISH: Have the fish checked and weighed by a conservation officer or other Game Commission official, obtain his signature, and submit this statement and other pertinent information to the Information and Tourism Division, Nebraska Game Commission, State Capitol, Lincoln, Nebr. 68509. If this is not possible the angler may submit a notarized affidavit signed by two witnesses, giving weight of the fish, where and when it was taken, girth, length and other information to the agency mentioned previously. Photographs of the fish should be made where and when possible.

BAIT MINNOWS



RESTRICTED SPECIES—It is unlawful to sell, transport, or offer for bait any carp, carpsucker, buffalo, gar, goldfish, quillback, or dogfish; and it is unlawful to use any of these fish for bait except in the water from which they are taken.

EXPORTING—No minnows taken from Nebraska waters may be transported out of the state in any manner, except: (a) Minnows artificially propagated in man-made impoundments by licensed fish culturists, and (b) No more than 100 legally captured minnows exported by a resident for his personal use in fishing outside the state.

IMPORTING—No person may import live bait minnows for commercial purposes, or in excess of 100 minnows for any purpose, without first obtaining a "certificate of inspection" from his State Game and Fish Department which certifies the fish are free from disease and parasites. A copy of the certificate must accompany the shipment and the original must be sent to the Nebraska Game Commission not less than three days before the shipment is made, along with the time, date, and place the fish will enter Nebraska. It is unlawful to import or transport carp, carpsucker, buffalo, goldfish, quillback, gar, salamanders or dogfish into the state for use as bait. A \$10 bait vendor's permit is required for a person to import and sell bait minnows.

STATE AREAS—Digging and seining for bait or for any other purpose on all state-owned and controlled areas is prohibited.

NEMAHA RIVERS—The main channels of the Big and Little Nemaha rivers, including the north and south forks of both, and within one mile of the mouth of all tributaries, in Gage, Johnson, Lancaster, Nemaha, Otoe, Pawnee, and Richardson counties, are closed to the taking of bait at all times.

GIZZARD SHAD—May be taken for use as bait by legal

minnow dip nets or landing nets in any number in lakes, ponds, reservoirs, and below dams and other artificial obstructions for a distance of 200 feet below such obstructions. Shad may be taken by legal minnow seine, dip net or landing net in any number in streams except those streams closed to the taking of minnows or bait by such methods.

TERRY'S AND CLEAR LAKES—The possession or use of live or dead minnows and the possession of any fish not taken from these waters is unlawful in Terry's Lake in Scotts Bluff County and Clear Lake in Brown County.

BELOW DAMS—The seining or capturing of minnows for commercial purposes for a distance of 200 yards below any dam, check, spillway, or other artificial obstruction is unlawful. This does not restrict individuals from using legal minnow dip nets in these areas to capture minnows for their own personal use.

CLOSED WATERS—Trout streams are closed to the taking of minnows or bait for any purpose (see "Special Areas" section).

VALENTINE AND CRESCENT LAKE WILDLIFE REFUGES—Use of any live or dead minnows or fish and possession of any seine or net for capturing minnows is prohibited.

TWO RIVERS RECREATION AREA—Live or dead minnows or fish of any species are prohibited as bait in this area (see "Special Areas" section).

BULLFROGS




Season on bullfrogs is from July 1 to November 1.

Bag and possession limit is 12 bullfrogs per person. Bullfrogs may be taken with a fishing permit only by hand, hand net, gig, or hook. A hunting permit is necessary to take bullfrogs with firearms or bow and arrow.

Artificial light may be used for taking bullfrogs.

SPECIAL AREAS

PLATTSMOUTH WATERFOWL MANAGEMENT AREA


—This area is open to fishing from 6:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m. from April 15 through September 15, except when closed by the Commission by posting. Boating and swimming are not permitted.

BURCHARD STATE LAKE—It is unlawful to fish or operate a boat on this Pawnee County lake during any waterfowl hunting season, except bank fishing from the

face of the dam is permitted during this closed period as posted by signs on the area. **It is unlawful to take flathead (mud or yellow) catfish from this lake until further notice.**

VALENTINE NATIONAL WILDLIFE REFUGE—Fishing is permitted during daylight hours only in areas designated by the refuge manager or by posting. Fishing is prohibited during duck hunting season and when posted. Use of any live or dead minnows or fish, possession of any seine or net for capturing minnows, and use of motorboats is prohibited.


CRESCENT LAKE NATIONAL WILDLIFE REFUGE—Fishing is permitted during daylight hours only in areas designated by the refuge manager or by posting. Fishing

is prohibited October 1 to December 1 and during migratory waterfowl hunting season and when posted. Use of any live or dead minnows or fish, possession of any seine or net for capturing minnows, and use of motorboats is prohibited.

NORTH PLATTE WILDLIFE REFUGE—Lakes in this Scotts Bluff County refuge are open to fishing from January 1 to September 30 or as designated by the refuge manager. Motorboats are permitted.

GEORGE'S LAKE—This Grant County lake is closed to all fishing.

TWO RIVERS RECREATION AREA—The Platte River bordering this area and all lakes (except Nos. 3, 4, and 5) are closed to fishing during the waterfowl hunting season. Ice fishing is not permitted. Archery fishing, snagging, spearing, gigging, snaring, and baiting is prohibited in all lakes. Live or dead minnows or fish of any species are prohibited as bait. Bag and possession limit is ten (10) fish, either game, non-game, or both.

Lake No. 5 is designated as a special trout lake, subject to the following additional regulations:

1. A daily trout fishing tag purchased for \$1.50 is required in addition to a regular Nebraska fishing permit.
2. Daily bag and possession limit—five trout.
3. Trout fishing will be permitted from April 1 to December 1, between sunrise and one-half

hour after sunset, or as prescribed and posted by the Commission.

4. Each fisherman must wear the special trout tag on his person in a conspicuous place while fishing.
5. Use of more than one pole or rod and more than two hooks per person is prohibited.
6. Each fisherman shall report and show his catch at the administration building and return his tag each day when finished.
7. Each fisherman's regular fishing permit will be held until his tag and catch report are returned.
8. Boats of all kinds are prohibited.
9. Each fish caught shall be counted in the bag limit and no fish caught shall be released.
10. Each fisherman shall keep his fish on a separate stringer or container and under his control.

TROUT WATERS—It is unlawful to take or attempt to take game or non-game fish by bow and arrow and to seine or take bait or minnows in any manner in the following trout streams: ANTELOPE COUNTY, Verdigre Creek and all tributaries. BROWN COUNTY, Long Pine Creek, Plum Creek and all tributaries, Calamus River, and Goose Creek. BOX BUTTE COUNTY, Niobrara River.


CHERRY COUNTY, North Loup River and all tributaries, Schlagel Creek, Fairfield Creek, Cedar Creeks, Snake River and all tributaries, Bear Creek, Plum Creek and all tributaries. DAWES COUNTY, Chadron Creek, Big Bordeaux Creek, Little Bordeaux Creek, White River above Crawford, Niobrara River from Box Butte Reservoir west to the Wyoming line and all tributaries, Dead Horse Creek, and White Clay Creek. DUNDY COUNTY, Buffalo Creek and Rock Creek. GARDEN COUNTY, Blue Creek. HOLT COUNTY, Steel Creek and North, Middle, and South branches of Verdigre Creek. HOOKER COUNTY, Dismal River and all tributaries. KEITH COUNTY, Otter Creek, White Tail Creek, and Lonergin Creek and all tributaries. KIMBALL COUNTY, Lodgepole Creek and all tributaries west of the West Kimball Reservoir. KNOX COUNTY, North, Middle, and South Verdigras and all tributaries above the town of Verdigre, and Steel Creek. LINCOLN COUNTY, Hershey Drains. LOGAN COUNTY, South Loup River. LOUP COUNTY, Gracie Creek. MORRILL COUNTY, all streams and tributaries except the channel or channels of the North Platte River. ROCK COUNTY, Calamus River, and Long Pine Creek. SIOUX COUNTY, Sheep Creek Drain, Dry Sheep Creek Drain, Dry Spotted Tail Drain, Spotted Tail Drain, Niobrara River and all tributaries, White River and all tributaries, Monroe Creek, Sowbelly Creek, Hat Creek, and Squaw Creek. THOMAS COUNTY, Dismal River. SCOTTS BLUFF COUNTY, all streams and tributaries except the channel or channels of the North Platte River. SHERIDAN COUNTY, Snake River, Larrabee Creek, White Clay Creek, Pine Creek, Deer Creek, and Little Bordeaux Creek. WEBSTER COUNTY, Elm Creek.


BOUNDARY WATERS:

LEWIS AND CLARK LAKE (Gavins Point Reservoir)—Anglers must carry a valid fishing license issued by the state from which he enters the lake or to which he returns. It is unlawful for any person to use more than two lines with more than two hooks on each line in the waters of this lake. The Lewis and Clark Lake includes all water area from the Gavins Point Dam upstream to the mouth of Bazile Creek in Knox County.

MISSOURI RIVER (South Dakota)—Any person taking fish from the Missouri River bordering South Dakota must carry a valid fishing license issued by the state from which he enters or to which he returns.


MISSOURI RIVER (Iowa)—Anglers holding a valid sport fishing permit from either Nebraska or Iowa may fish in the waters of the Missouri River lying between the two states. "Waters of the Missouri River" are defined to include all oxbows, sloughs, chutes and backwaters that draw water from the Missouri River proper. Oxbows, chutes and backwaters separated from the Missouri River by land are





included only if the state boundary line passes through some part of such waters. Fishing may be from boats or from the bank. All fishermen shall conform with the regulations of the state in which they are licensed. Anglers may transport fish taken from the "Waters of the Missouri River" through the neighboring state, provided they return to their home state by the most direct route.

DE SOTO BEND LAKE—Fishing is permitted as posted from January 1 through February 29 during daylight hours, and from 4:30 a.m. to 10:00 p.m., from May 1 through September 15. A sports fishing license from either Nebraska or Iowa is required when fishing in this lake. No more than two lines with one hook on each line may be used. Trot lines, spears, and bow and arrows are not permitted. Daily bag limits and species permitted shall conform with the regulations of the state in which the fisherman is licensed. The use of motor-boats is permitted.



POINTS TO REMEMBER

BAIT—Digging or seining for bait or for any other purpose is prohibited on all state lands.

STRINGERS—Each fisherman shall keep his fish on a separate stringer or in a separate container and under his control.

OPEN AREA—The entire state except those areas closed by Commission regulations, federal, or state law, or city ordinance is open to fishing. Privately-owned waters are open to fishing, provided permission of the owner is first received, even if the area is not posted.

FISH STOCKING—It is unlawful for any person, except authorized Game Commission employees, to stock in any manner any live fish in any public waters or to stock any non-game fish in any waters which overflow into or connect in any other way to public waters except legal minnows used on fish hooks for fishing.

HOOK AND LINE LIMITATIONS—No more than two lines with two hooks each are permitted in any lake, pond, or reservoir, or for one-half mile in their inlets, outlets, and canals. In stream and ice fishing no more than five hooks on a line or 15 hooks in the aggregate are allowed. One hook means a single, double, or treble-pointed hook, and all hooks attached to an artificial lure are counted as one hook.

SCENTS—Anise oil or other scents that do not stun, kill, or harm fish are permitted.

FLOAT LINES—The name and address of the owner shall be on or attached to all floats when used for float line fishing. The use of glass floats on float lines is unlawful.

UNDERWATER POWERED SPEARFISHING:

All individuals spearfishing in any manner must have a valid Nebraska resident or nonresident fishing permit. There is no closed season for spearfishing and there is no size, bag, or possession limits. Only buffalo, carp, gar, quillback, carpsucker, sucker, and shad may be taken while underwater spearfishing.

Spear guns lawful for use while spearfishing include hand spears, rubberband-powered spear guns, and spring-loaded spear guns. All spears used on powered spear guns shall be attached to a lanyard with a maximum length of 20 feet. It is unlawful to cock or discharge a powered spear gun while not submerged under water.

Spearfishing is not permitted within 100 yards of any designated swimming or water ski area, boat dock, or ramp, dams, or spillway. The following lakes are open to underwater spearfishing:


The International Divers Flag—a red flag with a white diagonal running from the upper lefthand corner to the lower righthand corner—shall be displayed on the water on a float or buoy during any diving or under-water powered spearfishing. The International Divers

Flag shall be displayed only while someone is diving and will indicate to boaters to proceed with caution in the area.

FISH NETS AND TRAPS:

The possession or use of any nets, traps, or other devices except the following is unlawful:

1. Minnow seines of one-fourth inch non-metallic square mesh only, and not over 20 feet long and 4 feet deep.
2. Minnow dip nets of one-fourth inch non-metallic square mesh, with a throat of not over 24



inches in diameter and a handle or handling device not over 4 feet long.

3. Minnow and bait traps of one-fourth inch square mesh material with a length of 24 inches or less, a diameter 16 inches or less, and a throat 1½ inches or less in diameter. All minnow traps shall be raised and the minnows removed at least every 24 hours.
4. Landing nets, made of non-metallic mesh, used only for landing fish caught on hook and line.

ARCHERY AND SNAGGING:

The taking of game and non-game fish with bow and arrow is permitted from April 1 to December 1, sunrise to sunset.

Snagging of game and non-game fish is prohibited in all waters of the state except the Missouri River from November 1 to April 1.

Bag and possession limits are the same as those for hook and line anglers.

Only the long bow, drawn by hand, may be used for bow and arrow fishing.

CLOSED WATER—Bow and arrow fishing and snagging is unlawful in "put and take" lakes stocked by the Game Commission, Two Rivers Recreation Area, DeSoto Bend Lake, and trout streams (see "Special Areas" section).

IT'S UNLAWFUL . . .

- . . . to borrow or use the permit of another or to lend your permit to another.
- . . . to use glass floats on float lines.
- . . . to use more than five hooks on a line or more than 15 hooks on all lines while stream or ice fishing.
- . . . to use more than two lines with more than two hooks on each line while fishing in any lake, pond, or reservoir, or for one-half mile in their inlets, outlets, and canals.
- . . . to leave fish or any part thereof on the banks of any stream, lake, or other body of water.
- . . . to fish on any private land without the permission of the owner.
- . . . to use a cross bow or similar device.
- . . . to seine game fish of any size.
- . . . to dig or seine for bait or for any other purpose in state-owned or controlled areas.
- . . . to leave minnows in a minnow trap for more than 24 hours.
- . . . to use float lines without attaching your name and address.
- . . . to add your catch to another angler's stringer.
- . . . to dive without properly displaying the International Divers Flag.



BOATING



For complete information about boat registration, open waters, closed waters, restricted waters, safety regulations, required lighting, navigation rules, and special regulations for regattas, races, and water shows, consult the 1964 Guide to NEBRASKA Land Boating. These handbooks are available from most boat dealers, marinas, and all Game Commission offices.

RESTRICTED BOATING AREAS

When operating in the below-listed waters, boaters must not exceed the speed limit of five miles per hour and must reduce their speed to keep their wash and wake from causing discomfort, hazard, injury, or damage to persons, vessels, or property.

- . . . Lake Ericson
- . . . Harlan County Reservoir—Within the area marked by buoys on Gremlin, Patterson, and Methodist Creek bays, and the beach area in Bone Cove.
- . . . Gavins Point Dam—That portion of the spillway and tailrace designated as the "Tailwaters Area."
- . . . Medicine Creek Reservoir—Concession Area Bay.
- . . . Swanson Reservoir—Macklin and Spring Creek bays.
- . . . Lake McConaughy—Otter Creek, Martin, and Emergency Spillway bays
- . . . Maloney Reservoir—Mills Lagoon, Field Club Bay, and canal leading to Field Club Bay.
- . . . Salt Creek No. 4 (Sprague)—Launching and docking areas marked by buoys.
- . . . Salt Creek No. 8 (Hickman).
- . . . Long Lake (Brown County).
- . . . Rat Lake (Cherry County).
- . . . Shell Lake (Cherry County).
- . . . Smith Lake (Sheridan County).
- . . . Grove Lake (Antelope County).
- . . . Burchard State Lake—Except during any waterfowl season when the lake is closed to all boating.

All motorboat traffic on Victory Lake and North Victory Lake in Fremont Recreation Area shall travel in a counter-clockwise direction, and at a speed of not over five miles per hour in channels, cuts, and refueling areas. It is unlawful to operate a motorboat within any area officially designated and marked for swimming.

Boats without motors may be used for fishing on waters open to fishing on the Valentine National Wildlife Refuge lakes. Boats may be placed on the waters of the refuge only where designated by posting.

CLOSED WATERS

Whenever safety requirements for persons or property demand immediate action and attention, the Commission may close for any necessary period, bodies of water or portions thereof, to any and all forms of boating. Closure shall be indicated by placement of notices on land or water.

Waters closed to all boating or motorboats include the following:

- ... Interstate Highway 80 lakes formed as a result of construction which are publicly owned or controlled are closed to motorboats.
- ... Burchard State Lake is closed during any waterfowl hunting season.
- ... Plattsmouth Waterfowl Management Area Lake is closed.
- ... Two Rivers Recreation Area Lake No. 5 is closed.
- ... Gavins Point Dam tailrace from the draft tube deck of the powerhouse downstream to the barrier cable (a distance of 310 feet).
- ... All privately-owned lakes without the consent of the owner.
- ... All state-owned lakes are closed to motorboats except those listed in the 1964 Guide to NEBRASKA Land Boating.
