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


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

General Regulations

NOTICE

This is a guide only. For sources, consult Nebraska statutes and official regulations.

CHANGES FOR 2006

Largemouth bass: Powder Creek Reservoir, Timber Point Lake and Walnut Creek 2A Lake now have 21-inch minimum length limits while Cheyenne State Recreation Area, Ponca State Park Pond, Two River State Recreation Area Lakes 3 and 4, and West Wood River Wildlife Management Area are total catch and release.

Channel and Blue catfish: Pibel Lake, Ponca State Park Pond and Two Rivers State Recreation Area lakes 1, 2, 6 and 7 now have a daily bag limit of three. Two Rivers State Recreation Area lakes 3 and 4 are total catch and release.

Panfish: Ponca State Park Pond is total catch and release.

Special Area Regulations: Two Rivers SRA Lake #5 – anglers are limited to one rod and reel; Lakes #3 and #4 remain as catch and release for largemouth bass and channel catfish; all other species may be harvested according to statewide regulations, only barbless hooks are allowed on Jenny Newman Lake (Platte River State Park) and Ponca State Park Pond.

Urban Fishing Areas: Bowling Lake (Lincoln) and Grand Island Gun Range Pond have catch and release restrictions on largemouth bass, a 10-fish daily bag limit on panfish and a three-fish daily bag limit on channel catfish. Lincoln Park Pond (Superior) was changed from a catch and release on bluegill to a daily bag limit of 10 panfish. Tilden City Pond was changed from a total catch and release to daily bag of one largemouth bass over 21

inches, a daily bag limit of 10 panfish and a daily bag limit of three channel catfish. West Point Park Pond has a daily bag limit of one largemouth bass over 21 inches, a daily bag limit of 10 panfish and a daily bag limit of three channel catfish. Wolbach City Pond changed from total catch and release on largemouth bass and bluegill to a daily bag limit of one largemouth bass over 21 inches and a daily bag limit of 10 panfish.

WHO IS REQUIRED TO HAVE A PERMIT?

A fishing permit is required to take or attempt to take fish, bullfrogs, snapping turtles, tiger salamanders or mussels by any method, except for the owner or the guest of the owner of any totally private water body which (1) is located entirely on private land, (2) is entirely privately stocked, (3) does not connect by inflow or outflow with any outside water and (4) is not operated commercially. **A resident fishing permit** is required for all Nebraskans 16 years of age and older. **Fee-exempt permits** are available to the following resident veterans: (1) 50 percent disabled as a result of service in the armed forces, (2) received a pension from the Veterans Administration as a result of a total and permanent disability not incurred in the line of duty in military service, and (3) those who obtained fee-exempt permits prior to January 1, 2006. An annual \$5 fish/hunt permit is available for veterans 64 and older and residents 69 and older. Aquatic habitat stamps are included with these fee-exempt permits.

The fishing permit must be carried by the holder while he/she is actively fishing.

Information and application forms for **fee-exempt fishing permits** are available from Game and Parks Commission offices across the state and also from permit agents.

A resident is a person who has resided in Nebraska continuously for at least 30 days and who has a bona fide intention of becoming a legal resident of this state. Others who may obtain a resident permit include: **(1)** military personnel officially stationed in Nebraska and on active duty here for at least 30 consecutive days; **(2)** nonresident students upon proof they have attended classes full time for at least 30 consecutive days at any Nebraska college, university, junior college, vocational school or any foreign exchange high school student; and **(3)** any person duly enrolled in and attending a civilian conservation center or similar government work or training facility for 30 consecutive days.

A **nonresident fishing permit** is required of all people who are not residents of Nebraska, except those listed and those under 16 years of age who are accompanied by someone possessing a valid permit.

A **“special fishing permit”** is available for physically disabled or developmentally disabled persons who cannot cast or retrieve without assistance. This permit entitles the disabled person and one person assisting him or her to take, fish, catch, harvest or possess any aquatic organism in compliance with state law. If the person assisting does not possess a current fishing permit, they are restricted to one daily bag limit between the two anglers. The annual permit is issued on a calendar year basis and costs \$5 regardless of the age of the applicant. A “disabled person” means a person certified by a physician to have a permanent physical impairment or developmental disability that results in the inability to use fishing equipment unassisted. Applications are available from the Game and Parks Commission headquarters in Lincoln or Commission offices in Alliance, Bassett, Kearney, Norfolk, North Platte, Omaha and Ak-Sar-Ben Aquarium at Gretna. The application must be verified by a physician before a permit can be issued.

An **Educational Fishing Project Permit** can be obtained by instructors of any university, college, or high school from the Fisheries Division for his or her students, 16 years of age and older that are participating in an educational fishing project.

See Boundary Waters section for permit requirements for fishing the waters of the Missouri River.

NEW OPPORTUNITIES IN LIFETIME PERMITS

Changes in the fee structure for Nebraska lifetime fishing and hunting permits for 2006 make them even better deals for younger and older Nebraskans. And for the first time, Nebraska lifetime permits are also available for nonresidents.


Lifetime fishing, hunting and hunt/fish combination permits are still offered. In each case, the lowest rate is paid by those permit holders, five years old and under. Those six to 15 years old and 46 years or older pay the intermediate fee, while the age group in their most active hunting and fishing years, 16 through 45, pays the most.

The fee for the fishing and hunt/fish combination permits include a lifetime aquatic habitat stamp. The habitat stamp for hunting and fur harvest is not included. Lifetime permits do not include big game hunting. See page 6 for a list of lifetime permit fees.

AQUATIC HABITAT STAMP PRINTED ON FISH PERMIT

The aquatic habitat stamp for 2006 is printed on the annual fishing permit and the fee is included in the permit purchase price. The traditional “lick-em and stick-em” stamp was not produced for 2006. Revenue from the habitat stamp fee is used exclusively to enhance and restore aquatic habitat and quality fishing in Nebraska’s rivers, lakes and streams.

Aquatic habitat stamps are included with fee-exempt permits for veterans 64 and older and residents 69 and older.



PARK ENTRY PERMIT

A vehicle Park Entry Permit is required to enter state park and state recreation areas to fish.

PENALTY FOR NO FISHING PERMIT

Under Nebraska State Law the minimum fine if convicted of fishing without a permit is \$75.00 the court cost, whether you appear or pay by waiver, is \$41.50, and damages assessed

for each fish range from \$20.00 to \$50.00 depending on the species and size of fish. The maximum fine is \$1,000 and/or six months jail time. It is important for anglers to purchase a fishing permit in order to support fisheries management across the state.

IT IS UNLAWFUL...

- to borrow or use the permit of another or lend your permit to another.
- to leave dead fish or any part thereof on the banks or in the water of any stream, lake or other body of water.
- to fish on any private land without landowner permission.
- to use a crossbow or similar device, while archery fishing except for a handicapped person who has a medical certificate on file.
- to seine sport fish of any size.
- to use float lines.
- to leave fish in a trap for more than 24 hours.
- to release in public waters of the state any fish that did not originate in that body of water.
- to attempt to snag fish, except in areas designated. See section on snagging for details.
- to use limb lines or set lines in any pond, lake or reservoir.
- to catch fish by hand
- to purchase or attempt to purchase a permit while under license suspension or revocation in any state.
- to keep an externally foul-hooked fish except those legally snagged.
- to consume and/or have an open container of alcohol at any state park, state recreation area or wildlife management area.


SEASONS

Hook-and-Line: Open year-round throughout the state, except as noted or as posted at an area.

Archery: Game fish may be taken from sunrise to sunset from July 1

Fishing

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through Dec. 31 statewide, except paddlefish in the Missouri River. Nongame fish may be taken year-round, sunrise to sunset and from Apr. 1 through Aug. 31, 24 hours a day, statewide. Paddlefish archery season begins on the second Saturday of July and runs for 30 consecutive days. A valid Paddlefish Tag is required (see section on Paddlefish, pgs. 20-23). See section on Archery/Surface Spearing (pg. 13) for other exceptions. Length and bag limits apply for archery.

Snagging: The paddlefish snagging season is Oct. 1 through Oct. 30. A valid paddlefish tag is required. See section on Paddlefish Tags (pg. 22). All other waters of the state are closed to snagging at all times. See section on Snagging (pg. 9).

Surface Spearing: The entire state is open to the taking of nongame fish year-round, sunrise to sunset. Spearing is allowed 24 hours a day Apr. 1 through Aug. 31.

Underwater Spearing: Game fish may be taken from sunrise to sunset July 1 through Dec. 31. Nongame fish

may be taken year-round, sunrise to sunset. See Underwater Sparring section (pg. 13) for open waters.

HOOK AND LINE LIMIT

Ponds, lakes or reservoirs - Anglers are limited to no more than two lines with a maximum of two hooks on each line with these being any type of attached line (rod and reel or fishing pole) on all lakes,

ponds or reservoirs or in their inlets, outlets and canals within one-half mile of these water bodies with the exception of ice-fishing line limits. This includes Lewis and Clark Lake from Gavins Point Dam upstream to the Santee boat ramp in Knox County, Nebraska.

Ice-fishing - A total of five lines with two hooks on each line are permitted while ice-fishing, unless restrictions are

listed for a specific area in the Public Fishing Area section. Each ice-fishing line must be under direct supervision and within unaided observation of the angler.

Rivers or streams - A total of 15 hooks are allowed ranging from 15 lines with a single hook attached or three lines with a maximum total of five hooks attached. These can be rod and reels, poles, bank lines or set lines which are in some way attached to the bank and not free-floating. Float lines are not legal in Nebraska. Float lines are defined as any line not attached to the shoreline or pole. All bank lines and set lines must contain identification to include name, address and fishing permit number or current driver's license number.

Note - Upon completion of fishing, all bank lines and set lines must be removed.

Snagging - Only one hook which has a gap between the point of the hook to the shank of not more than one-half inch is allowed.

Definition of a hook - one hook means a single, double or treble-pointed hook. All hooks attached to an artificial bait or lure shall be counted as one hook.

SNAGGING

Snagging of paddlefish and nongame fish is permitted only in the Missouri River under season dates and limits specified in the Paddlefish and Snagging of Nongame Fish (pg. 20) section. All other waters of the state are closed to snagging for all species at all times. All fish that are snagged accidentally or otherwise foul-hooked must be returned to the water immediately.

NONGAME FISH

All species that do not appear on any of the above lists are considered nongame.

BAIT REGULATIONS

Baitfish, listed amphibians and crayfish may not be sold except by permit. For commercial purposes (bait dealers, private aquaculturists and nonresident fish dealers), refer to the official regulations supplied with your permit. The following regulation guidelines apply only to bait obtained for personal use. It is unlawful to take baitfish, listed amphibians or crayfish from any lake, reservoir or bayou unless otherwise stated below. Digging and trapping for bait or any other purpose is prohibited on all state-owned or controlled areas. Seining for baitfish, listed amphibians or crayfish is allowed on streams located on SRA's and WMA's unless the stream is listed as closed. All non-baitfish, of whatever size, taken while netting or seining for bait must immediately be returned to the waters from which taken. The bag and possession limit of baitfish and listed amphibians for personal use is 100.

Gizzard Shad and Alewife: May be taken for use as bait by legal dip nets from lakes, ponds, reservoirs, and below dams and other artificial obstructions for a distance of 200 yards below such obstructions. Live shad and alewife can only be used in the body of water in which they were captured (see section on cast nets). Shad and alewife may be taken by legal seine, or dip net in streams except those streams closed to the taking of baitfish or bait by such method. Bag and possession limit is 100.

Below Dams: The seining of baitfish, listed amphibians or crayfish is unlawful for a distance of 200 yards below any dam or spillway. In these waters, baitfish, listed amphibians, and crayfish can be taken by legal baitfish dip nets for personal use only.

Restricted Species: It is unlawful to sell, transport or offer for sale as bait, any live carp, carpsucker, bullhead, buffalo, gar, quillback, gizzard shad, alewife or bowfin. Live fish of those species may be used for bait only in the same waters from which they are legally taken. Dead carp, carpsucker, bullhead, buffalo, gar,

quillback, gizzard shad, alewife or bowfin may be transported for use as bait. Sport fish can be used for bait: **(1)** if they have been legally acquired from a licensed aquaculturist or a nonresident fish dealer. The angler must keep a legible receipt or invoice from the dealer listing the date, seller's name and address; and number and size of each species sold, or **(2)** if they are captured using hook and line and used at the body of water from which they were captured. In the latter case, the angler will be required to follow both length and bag limits that are enforced on that water body.

NO LIVE BAITFISH AREAS

The following areas do not allow the use or possession of live baitfish:

- Chalkrock Lake (Cedar County)
- Cottonmill Lake (Buffalo County)
- Crescent Lake National Wildlife Refuge (Garden County)
- Frye Lake (Grant County)
- Holmes Lake (Lancaster County)
- Olive Creek Lake (Lancaster County)
- Pibel Lake (Wheeler County)
- Valentine National Wildlife Refuge (Cherry County)
- Wagon Train Lake (Lancaster County)
- Wildwood Lake (Lancaster County)
- Yankee Hill Lake (Lancaster County)

White Perch: It is illegal to transport or possess live white perch away from the water body from which they were caught.

Dumping baitfish: It is illegal to release your baitfish or any fish caught from a different waterbody into public waters.

Exporting: Up to 100 legally captured baitfish and/or listed amphibians can be exported by a resident for personal use for fishing outside the state. No other baitfish taken from Nebraska waters may be transported out of the state in any manner, except baitfish artificially propagated in man-made impoundments by licensed aquaculturists.



Importing: It is unlawful to import or transport carp, carpsucker, buffalo, quillback, gar, gizzard shad, alewife or bowfin into the state for use as bait. Special permits are required for a person to import and sell bait or baitfish.

Baits and Scents: Cutbait is legal if the fish used has been legally acquired and the size, bag and possession limits for that species and water body have been followed. It is also legal to chum for fish using non-harmful baits. Anise oil and other scents that do not stun, kill or harm fish are permitted.

Leopard Frogs and Tiger Salamanders: All regulations that cover the legal use of baitfish also apply to the use of leopard frogs and tiger salamanders.

Crayfish: There is no limit on the number of crayfish a person may possess. Anyone over the age of 16 must have a bait dealers license in order to sell crayfish. Crayfish may be captured by hook and line, by hand or by legal fish nets and traps as described below.

Fish Nets and Traps: The possession or use of nets, traps and electrical gear capable of stunning fish is prohibited except for the following:

- Baitfish seines of one-fourth inch non-metallic square mesh only and not over 20 feet long and four feet deep.
- Baitfish dip nets of one-fourth inch non-metallic square mesh. Neither length nor width may exceed 36 inches.
- Baitfish and bait traps of one-fourth inch square mesh material with a length of 24 inches or less, a diameter of 16 inches or less and a throat one inch or less in diameter. All minnow traps shall be raised and the baitfish removed at least every 24 hours.
- Landing nets, made of non-metallic mesh, used only for landing fish caught on hook-and-line.

CAST NETS

Cast nets may be used to collect bait with the following restrictions:

- Only cast nets up to 10 feet in diameter with a mesh size no larger than three-eighths inches square measure are legal gear.
- May be used only during the months of July, August, September, October and November.
- May be used to collect gizzard shad and alewife only.
- Live gizzard shad and alewife may only be used for bait the same day

they were captured in the same water body where they were collected.

- Cast nets may be used only on the following water bodies: Calamus Reservoir, Davis Creek Reservoir, Elwood Reservoir, Enders Reservoir, Farwell South Reservoir, Gallagher Canyon Reservoir, Harlan County Reservoir, Jeffrey Reservoir, Johnson Lake, Lake Maloney, Medicine Creek Reservoir, Lake McConaughy, Phillips Canyon Reservoir, Plum Creek Reservoir, Red Willow Reservoir, Sherman Reservoir, Sutherland Reservoir, Swanson Reservoir and the Tri-County Canal from the diversion dam in Lincoln County to the J-2 return.

FISH STOCKING

It is unlawful to release any non-native fish, reptile or amphibian in waters of the state or to release any fish in any public waters in the state except in those waters from which it came, without written authorization from the Game and Parks Commission.

NOTICE: DO NOT transfer any fish from one lake or stream to another. It is illegal to dump baitfish in a water body. You could be destroying your own fishing!

FREE FISHING DAY MAY 20

Free Fishing and Park Entry Day is intended to attract those who no longer fish or who have never fished and to give them an opportunity to do so without purchasing a permit. It is held on the Saturday prior to Memorial Day weekend. Anglers, both resident and nonresident, can take advantage of that day by taking a nonangler friend to any water body in the state and showing them how much fun fishing can be.

TROUT WATERS

It is unlawful to possess a dip/landing net or seine of any type on trout streams in Sioux, Scotts Bluff, Morrill, Garden and Keith counties that are tributaries to the North Platte River and

Lake McConaughy, including: Pumpkin, Red Willow, Wildhorse, Stuckenhole, Nine Mile, Tub Springs, Winter, Sheep, Dry Sheep, Spotted Tail, Dry Spotted Tail, Otter, Clear, Lonergan, Upper Dugout, Indian, Silvernail Drain and Cedar creeks.

It is unlawful to take or attempt to take sport or nongame fish by bow and arrow or spearing or to take or attempt to take by seine or trap any bait or minnows in any of the following trout streams:

Antelope County: Verdigre Creek and all tributaries.

Brown County: Bone Creek and all tributaries, Long Pine Creek and all tributaries, Plum Creek and all tributaries and Fairfield Creek.

Box Butte County: Niobrara River.

Cherry County: Middle Loup River and all tributaries, North Loup River and all tributaries, Schlagel Creek, Fairfield Creek, Snake River and all tributaries, Plum Creek and all tributaries.

Cheyenne County: Lodgepole Creek west of Brownson.

Dawes County: Chadron Creek, Big Bordeaux Creek, Little Bordeaux Creek, White River above Crawford, Niobrara River from Box Butte Reservoir west to the Wyoming line and all tributaries, Dead Horse Creek, Squaw Creek and White Clay Creek.

Garden County: Blue Creek.

Holt County: Steel Creek and North, Middle and South branches of Verdigre Creek.

Hooker County: Dismal River and all tributaries.

Keith County: Otter Creek, Whitetail Creek and Lonergan Creek and all tributaries.

Kimball County: Lodgepole Creek and all tributaries.

Knox County: North, Middle and South Verdigre Creek and all tributaries above the town of Verdigre and Steel Creek.

Loup County: Gracie Creek.

Morrill County: Red Willow Creek, Cedar Creek, Greenwood Creek, Wildhorse Creek, Lawrence Fork Creek, Silvernail Drain, Indian Creek, Stuckenhole Creek and Pumpkin Creek below Highway 88.

Rock County: Long Pine Creek.

Scotts Bluff County: Ninemile Creek, Winters Creek, Tub Springs, Wet Spotted Tail Creek, Dry Spotted Tail Creek, Sheep Creek, Dry Sheep Creek, Stuckenhole Creek, Akers Draw, Mitchell Drain, Moffat Drain, Alliance Drain and Bayard Drain.

Sheridan County: Snake River, Larabee Creek, White Clay Creek, Pine Creek, Deer Creek and Little Bordeaux Creek.

Sioux County: Sheep Creek Drain, Dry Sheep Creek Drain, Dry Spotted Tail Creek, Spotted Tail Creek, Niobrara River and all tributaries, White River, Soldier Creek and all tributaries, Monroe Creek, Sowbelly Creek and Hat Creek.

Webster County: Elm Creek.

ARCHERY/SURFACE SPEARFISHING

Game fish may be taken by bow and arrow from July 1 through Dec. 31 from sunrise to sunset, statewide. Game fish may not be taken with surface spears. Nongame fish may be taken by archery or surface spear statewide from sunrise to sunset between Sept. 1 and Mar. 30 and 24 hours a day from Apr. 1 through Aug. 31.

Only hand-drawn longbows (including compound bows) are legal. A crossbow may be used by a handicapped person who has a medical certificate on file with the Game and Parks Commission. Arrows may have only one point, which must be barbed, and must be attached by a line to the bow at the time the arrow is released. For surface spearing, only hand spears are legal. All spearing devices must be barbed.

The following waters are closed year-round: Two Rivers, Louisville, Fort

Kearny, Fremont, Mormon Island and Windmill SRA's; Platte River and E. T. Mahoney state parks and trout streams (see Trout Waters pgs. 12-13).

UNDERWATER SPEARFISHING

Lawful spear guns include hand spears, rubber band-powered spear guns and spring-loaded spear guns. All spears used on powered spear guns must be attached to a lanyard no more than 20 feet long. Underwater spearfishing is not permitted within 100 yards of any designated swimming or water-ski jump area, boat dock, boat ramp or spillway.

Seasons

Game fish: July 1 through Dec. 31 in waters listed below. Bag, possession and length limits are the same as for hook and line, except that there is a daily bag limit of 2 walleyes and a possession limit of 4 walleyes in effect on all lakes listed below. Hours are sunrise to sunset.

Nongame fish: Open year-round in waters listed below. There are no size, bag or possession limits. Hours are sunrise to sunset.

Diver's Flag

The diver's flag must be displayed on the water on a float or buoy when diving or underwater-powered spearfishing. Divers and underwater spearfishers must remain within 150 feet of the flag. The flag must be at least 12 inches square, with a red background and white diagonal stripe that is one-fifth the width of the flag. The white stripe must run from the top of the hoist to the bottom of the flag. It is unlawful to display this flag when diving or spearfishing is not in progress.

THREATENED AND ENDANGERED SPECIES

It is unlawful to take by seine, dip net or trap any baitfish in the following streams that contain threatened and endangered fish species:

Cherry County: Brush Creek west of Brownlee, and Gordon Creek west of Highway 61.

Dawes County: Niobrara River east of

Box Butte Reservoir and west of Highway 385.

Keya Paha County: Cottonwood Creek, East Holt Creek and Holt Creek

Madison County: Taylor Creek west of Highway 81.

BAG / POSSESSION

Bag and possession limits may vary between "Inland Waters" and "Waters of the Missouri River." For this purpose only, Inland Waters includes all waters of the state except the waters of the Missouri River. Waters of the Missouri River include all of the river within Nebraska and all reservoirs, oxbows, sloughs, chutes, backwaters and marshes that have annual surface water connection to the river and the first 300 yards upstream from the mouth of all tributary streams.

Any fish that is not to be counted in the bag limit must be returned immediately to the water with as little injury as possible. Any fish placed on a stringer or in a container, or not returned to the water must be counted in the bag, thus no culling or high-grading is allowed.

Daily Bag: The daily bag limit is fish harvested from midnight to midnight. No person may possess more than one day's bag limit of fish while on the water or actively engaged in fishing.

Possession Limit: This is the total number of a species of fish that a person may have in possession in portable coolers, home freezers, registered in his name in a commercial cold storage locker or in any other way under their control. Fish or aquatic animals placed in public storage or transferred must be labeled with the owner's name, address, phone number, date of birth, signature, date taken, species and numbers and the name of recipient if they are transferred.

Length Limit: The defined length of a fish species that can be legally taken.

The proper method to obtain the length of a fish is to lay the fish on its side with its mouth closed and the tail lobes pressed together. With a yard stick

or tape measure under the fish, measure the length from the tip of the snout to the end of the tail. (Do not follow the contour of the fish, that will exaggerate its length).

Length Limits and Cleaning of Fish:

Where length and bag limits apply, fish cannot be filleted until fishing is completed for the day and anglers are off the water. Fish species subject to a bag limit and possession limit, but not a length limit, can be filleted prior to transport if the fillets are kept in one piece until cooked, so the bag and possession limits can be determined. Fish species subject to a length limit cannot be possessed with more than the gills, viscera and scales removed while on the water, wading or engaged in fishing. Any fish in possession while actively fishing or on the water will be subject to length and bag limits that apply to the water being fished. Once off the water, the fish can be filleted for transportation and storage.


BULLFROGS

Bullfrog season runs Aug. 15 through Oct. 31. The bag limit is eight bullfrogs per person. They may be captured only by hand, by the use of a hand net or hook-and-line. Artificial light may be used when taking bullfrogs. Bullfrogs must measure 4½ inches from snout to

vent or be released. Only the entrails may be removed prior to transport.

SNAPPING TURTLES

Snapping turtles may be taken year-round, and limits are 10 in the daily bag and 20 in possession. They may be taken only by hand, hand net, hook-and-line, bow-and-arrow or gaff hook.

MUSSELS (CLAMS)

Mussels may be taken year-round by hand, hand net or hook-and-line. The limit is 10 daily and 20 in possession.

15-inch minimum: Statewide on all government or publicly-owned, controlled or managed waters, except where other limits apply, and parts of the Missouri River. This also includes the following Missouri River lakes and oxbows: DeSoto National Wildlife Refuge Lake, Washington County; Snyder Bend Lake, Dakota and Thurston counties; and Lake Yankton, Cedar County.

21-inch minimum: Auburn Rotary Lake (Nemaha County), Buckskin Hills Lake (Dixon County), Burchard Lake (Pawnee County), Olive Creek Lake (Lancaster County), Powder Creek Reservoir (Dixon County), Skyview Lake (Madison County), Stagecoach Lake (Lancaster County), Swan Creek Lake 5A (Saline County), Timber Point Lake (Butler County), Ta-Ha-Zouka Park Lake (Norfolk), Wagon Train Lake (Lancaster County), Walnut Creek Recreation Area (Sarpy County), Walnut Creek 2A (Saline County), Wehrspann Lake (Sarpy County), Willow Lake (Brown County), Verdon Lake (Richardson County),

Yankee Hill Lake (Lancaster County), York Recharge Lake (York County) and Zorinsky Lake (Douglas County).

Note: The statewide bag limit only allows one bass 21 inches or longer.

Catch and release largemouth bass lakes: Refer to Public Waters Section beginning on pages 46 and 47.

Bass (Smallmouth and Spotted)

12-inch minimum: Statewide on all publicly owned, controlled or managed waters, except where other limits apply and parts of the Missouri River. There is a 12-inch minimum length limit on all black bass in the section of the Missouri River between Nebraska and Iowa and Nebraska and Missouri.

Walleye, Sauger and Saugeye

15-inch minimum: Statewide except for that portion of the Missouri River downstream of Gavins Point Dam and reservoirs with more restrictive length limits listed below. DeSoto National Wildlife Refuge Lake (Washington Co.) has a 15 inch minimum length. The daily bag limit of four fish can include only one over 22 inches in length with the exception of Elwood Reservoir, which allows only one fish over 24 inches.

18-inch minimum: Harlan County Reservoir (including the Republican River upstream to the Highway 46 bridge), Harlan County; Sherman Reservoir, Sherman County; Calamus Reservoir, Loup and Garfield Counties.

Other special walleye length limits: Merritt Reservoir, the daily bag limit of four may include one walleye 15 to 18 inches and three over 18 inches or four over 18 inches, but only one walleye over 22 inches is allowed. Elwood Reservoir is regulated with a 15-inch minimum length limit in conjunction with an 18 to 24-inch protected slot limit with only one walleye over 24 inches allowed in the daily bag limit. At Branched Oak Reservoir the daily bag limit is one fish 22 inches or longer.

Special restrictions at Lake McConaughy can be found in the Nebraska's Public Fishing Areas section, which begins on page 46.

Muskellunge/Tiger Muskie

40-inch minimum: Statewide.

Shovelnose Sturgeon

No harvest is allowed on that portion of the Missouri River upstream from the mouth of the Big Sioux River.

28-inch maximum: Valentine National Wildlife Refuge

30-inch minimum: Alda DOR (Hall County), Blue Hole East WMA (Buffalo County), Grove Lake (Antelope County), Cottonmill Lake (Kearney County), Enders Reservoir (Chase County), Red Willow Reservoir (Frontier County), Maskenthine Reservoir (Stanton County), and Sherman Reservoir (Sherman County).

28-inch to 34-inch protected slot length limit: Goose Lake and Swan Lake (Holt County).

Crappie

10-inch minimum: Branched Oak Reservoir (Lancaster County), Cottonmill Lake (Buffalo County), Czechland Lake (Saunders County), Sherman Reservoir (Sherman County), Walnut Creek Recreation Area and Wehrspann* Lake (Sarpy County), Yanney Park Lake (Buffalo County), and Zorinsky* Lake (Douglas County).

***Note:** The length limit is not in effect during the month of April on Wehrspann and Zorinsky lakes.

Sunfish

8-inch minimum: Czechland Lake (Saunders County), Mormon Island Lakes No. 1, 2, and 3 (Hall County), Olive Creek Lake, Stagecoach Reservoir and Wagon Train Lake (Lancaster County), Walnut Creek Recreation Area (Sarpy County), Wildwood Lake (Lancaster County), Windmill SRA No. 4, and Yankee Hill Lake (Lancaster County).

Striped Bass and Hybrids/White Bass (combined)

18-inch minimum: Bridgeport SRA, Fremont SRA, Fort Kearny SRA, Louisville SRA and Windmill SRA.

Note: Only one over 18 inches in daily bag limit: Statewide

Channel and Blue Catfish

Total catch and release - Wildwood and Two Rivers SRA lakes 3 and 4.

Flathead Catfish

Total catch and release - Branched Oak Reservoir.

Trout

20-inch minimum: Lake Ogallala (Keith County) on brown trout. Combination daily bag, which includes all trout species, is four with a possession limit of eight.

Total catch and release - Big Bordeaux Creek on Big Bordeaux Creek WMA.

Bullfrogs

4½-inch minimum: Statewide

All Other Species:

No length requirements.

ICE-FISHING

When ice-fishing, only five lines with no more than two hooks on each line are permitted. Each line or tip-up used while fishing public waters must be under the direct supervision and within the unaided observation of the angler. Holes made for ice-fishing may not exceed 10 inches in diameter on any area controlled by the Game and Parks Commission.

A special \$5 permit is required for a permanent shelter on state recreation and wildlife management area lakes. Applications and regulations are available from conservation officers, Commission offices or by mail from the Game and Parks Commission, Box 30370, Lincoln, NE 68503. This does not apply to temporary shelters used and removed each day.



AREAS OPEN TO THE USE OF ATV'S AND SNOWMOBILES FOR ICE-FISHING

Snowmobiles, all-terrain and motorized off-highway amphibious vehicles may be operated on the frozen surface of the following designated lakes, unless otherwise posted as being closed: Bluestem, Branched Oak, Conestoga, Olive Creek, Pawnee, Stagecoach, Wagon Train, Enders, Medicine Creek, Red Willow, Swanson, Box Butte, Merritt, Oliver, Sherman, Elwood, Sutherland and Calamus Reservoirs; Fremont Lakes, Gallagher Canyon, Johnson Lake, Lake Maloney, Lake McConaughy, Lake Minatare, Lake Ogallala, Lewis and Clark Lake, Louisville Lakes, Rockford Lake, Summit Lake, Willow Creek Lake, Walgren Lake, Willow Lake (Brown County), Big Alkali Lake, and Cottonwood-Steverson Lake. These vehicles can be operated on these areas only from one-half hour before sunrise until 9:00 p.m. or as posted. It is recommended that these vehicles not be used unless the ice thickness is a minimum of eight inches.

BORDER WATERS

Missouri River (South Dakota, Iowa and Missouri): Anglers holding a valid Nebraska, South Dakota, Iowa or Missouri sport fishing license or permit may fish all waters of the Missouri River in the state they are licensed, as well as Missouri River waters of the state immediately across that river. Waters of the Missouri River are defined to include all flowing portions and backwaters, sloughs and chutes that draw water from the Missouri River. Oxbows and backwaters separated from the Missouri River by land are included if the state boundary line passes through some part of such waters. Mouths of tributaries may only be fished in the state that the angler is licensed. Anglers may fish from either bank or boats. Anglers fishing in the


state for which they do not hold a fishing permit must abide by the more restrictive of the two state's regulations. Both Iowa and Missouri resident anglers can fish waters of Hamburg Bend WMA and the Nebraska portion of the Missouri River from the chute entrance (adjacent to Iowa) to the chute exit (adjacent to Missouri).

PADDLEFISH AND SNAGGING OF NONGAME FISH

Missouri River - Snagging of paddlefish and nongame fish is permitted from the Gavins Point Dam downstream to the mouth of the Big Sioux River at Mile Marker 734, except

for a closed area that extends downstream from Gavins Point Dam to a line that extends from the east end of the south cement wall of the discharge channel northwest to the east end of the chalk point. However, snagging off the north wall of the spillway is prohibited. All snaggers must obtain and have in their possession an unfilled paddlefish tag while actively snagging in addition to a valid fishing permit, if required. From Gavins Point Dam to 0.6 mile downstream, they may fish only with a Nebraska resident or nonresident fishing permit or a South Dakota resident permit. In the remainder of the river open to snagging, South Dakota nonresident permits are also valid.

Paddlefish harvested by snagging may be possessed only on the Missouri River during the respective open season in the designated open area. All inland waters are closed to paddlefish harvest. The snagging season runs only from Oct. 1 through Oct. 30. Legal hours are 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Applicants must be 12 years old by Oct. 1 in order to apply for a snagging permit (see section on



Paddlefish Tags). A paddlefish must be tagged immediately in the dorsal fin with the angler's tag upon addition to the creel. Any paddlefish tag that is locked prior to attachment, altered or modified shall be void and **WILL NOT BE REPLACED**. Only one hook may be used when snagging, and the gap between the point of the hook to the shank may not exceed one-half inch.



The daily bag and possession limits are the total number of tags issued to an individual. A harvest quota will be managed by issuing a limited number of paddlefish tags with a limit of no more than two tags per person. (Consult section on paddlefish tags, pgs. 22-23). All paddlefish anglers are required to cast for and hook their own fish. All paddlefish between 35 and 45 inches long (measured along the center line of the fish, lying flat, from the front margin of the eye to the natural fork of the tail), must be returned to the water immediately. The slot limit is designed to protect spawning-size fish.

It is unlawful to use a gaff hook or other penetrating device while landing snagged paddlefish. Immediate cleaning of a snagged paddlefish is restricted to the removal of only the snout, in front of the eye, and the viscera. Final processing may not be completed until anglers have reached their residence or prior to consumption. Anglers should be prepared to transport a large paddlefish with only the snout removed, if they choose to harvest a fish more than 45 inches in length.

PADDLEFISH - ARCHERY

Missouri River

Paddlefish may be taken by bow and arrow and possessed on open waters of the Missouri River only during the season that begins on the second Saturday of July and runs for 30 consecutive days, with legal hours being sunrise to sunset. The area of the Missouri River open to archery paddlefish is from Gavins Point Dam downstream to the mouth of the Big Sioux River at mile marker 734, except for a closed



area downstream from Gavins Point Dam to a line that extends from the east end of the south cement wall of the discharge channel northwest to the east end of the north wall of the spillway. The area downstream of this line is open to archers taking both game and nongame fish during the appropriate seasons.

Paddlefish harvested by bow and arrow may be possessed only on the Missouri River during the respective season in the designated open area. All paddlefish archery anglers must obtain and have in their possession a paddlefish tag in addition to a fishing permit. Applicants must be 12 years old by the second Saturday of July to apply. See section on Paddlefish Tags on (pgs. 22-23). Any paddlefish landed must be tagged immediately in the dorsal fin with the angler's tag. Any paddlefish tag that is locked shut prior to attachment, altered or modified shall be void and **WILL NOT BE REPLACED**. A harvest quota will be managed by issuing a limited number of paddlefish tags with a limit of no more than two tags per person. Only the head, viscera and tail may be removed from archery-harvested paddlefish during transport until the place of residence is reached or the paddlefish is consumed.

NEBRASKA PADDLEFISH HARVEST TAGS

The paddlefish is a limited and precious resource, and it is important that the harvest be closely regulated. A tag will be required for both archers and snaggers who want to harvest a paddlefish (see “Paddlefish Archery” pg 21 and “Paddlefish Snagging” pg.20).

It is important to remember that one person can have no more than two tags for the archery season and two for the snagging season. These tags are nontransferable, they must be in possession while actively pursuing paddlefish, and they must be immediately attached and locked shut to the dorsal fin of a harvested paddlefish. Archers will have a 30 consecutive day season, beginning on the **second Saturday of July**, and snaggers will have a 30-day season, **October 1- 30**.

Application Fee:

A \$5.00 application fee must be

submitted by each **resident and non-resident** applicant in order to be placed into the drawing for a paddlefish tag. This is a nonrefundable fee. To apply for a paddlefish tag, fill out the form on page 23 or apply online at **www.outdoornebraska.org**. An angler may apply only once during each application period. Two applicants are allowed to submit a joint application (buddy permit) with priority given to the applicant with the least preference points.

Archery and Snagging Preference System

- **Preference.** During the first application period, preference will be given to those who did not have a permit the previous year.

If all tags are taken in the first application period, there will be no second application period.

Paddlefish Archery Harvest Tag Application Periods

First Application Period April 1 - 30*

There will be no second drawing if all harvest tags are issued in the first drawing

Second Application Period (**First or Second Tag**) May 15 - 31*

General Information

FISH SALVAGE IN IRRIGATION CANALS

The Nebraska Game and Parks Commission (NGPC) has implemented regulations affecting fish salvage activities on dewatered irrigation canals.

The following list summarizes the regulations for fish salvage of irrigation canals:

- Fish salvage is restricted to canals listed in the regulations.
- An application must be filled out, approved by NGPC, and carried by parties conducting fish salvage on canals.
- Stocking fish in any waterbody with fish salvaged from irrigation canals must be approved on the salvage application form.
- Salvaged sport fish taken for human consumption are subject to all statewide length, daily bag and possession limits.
- Salvaged baitfish must comply with bait collection regulations.
- All approved fish salvaged from irrigation canals must be reported to NGPC on the report form provided.

The following is a list of canals where the Commission may authorize salvage activities during dewatering:

 - Buffalo County:** Kearney Canal
 - Dawson County:** Buffalo Creek Supply Canal, Cozad Irrigation Canal, Dawson County Irrigation Canal, Farmers and Merchant Canal

 - Dawson and Lincoln Counties:** Gothenburg Canal, Orchard and Alfalfa Canal, Six-Mile Irrigation Canal, Thirty-Mile Irrigation Canal
 - Gosper County:** E67 Canal System

Fish salvage application and report forms are available at NGPC district offices in Alliance, Bassett, Kearney, Lincoln, Norfolk and North Platte. Application forms must be approved by staff in the NGPC district office prior to any salvage efforts. More detailed information, including copies of salvage regulations, is available at all NGPC district offices.

WEST NILE VIRUS

The arrival of the mosquito-borne West Nile virus in Nebraska has resulted in the stocking of “mosquitofish,” an ill-advised effort to control the disease’s carriers. This non-native, properly called *Gambusia*, is billed as a mosquito-eating machine, but is no more effective than several species of native fish. The *Gambusia* is, in fact, a threat to many native species of fish and stocking them without authorization by the Game and Parks Commission is illegal. If fish are needed to eliminate mosquitoes in standing water, the Commission recommends fathead minnows, efficient mosquito predators and common throughout the state. Fathead minnows can be purchased from most bait dealers, and at a much lower price than fish culturists charge for *Gambusia*.

HELP WANTED

You can help fisheries managers by returning the tags from any tagged fish you catch. It will be returned along with data on where the fish was tagged.

FISH KILL REPORTS

Report dead or dying fish by notifying your local conservation officer, district Game and Parks Commission office or the 24-hour State Patrol pollution complaint number, (402) 471-4545, as soon as possible. Prompt notification will make it easier to determine the cause.

Keep the water safe and clean for future fishing. Report dumping/pollution activities to the Environmental Protection Agency at 1-800-223-0425.

PRIVATE WATERS

Permission from the landowner is required to access any body of water, or stream located on private property. The issue of fishing private waters raises several questions. Although a private body of water may receive fish for stocking from the Game and Parks

Commission, the owner controls access to it and anyone fishing it must have a valid fishing permit. What constitutes a private pond that does not require anglers to have a fishing permit? The only exception to the requirement of a fishing permit is when a body of water is entirely on private land, has been entirely stocked with private hatchery-reared fish, and does not connect by inflow or outflow with other waters outside the pond owner’s property. An unlicensed angler who catches fish from such a body of water and wants to remove them from the premises must have a written statement from the pond owner listing the pond owner’s name and the number of fish taken.

On a river or stream, when can a person legally enter private property without the owner’s permission? After properly accessing a flowing body of water, an angler can fish while afloat in a tube, canoe or boat. An angler or canoeist in an unpowered vessel can enter private property without permission only if it’s necessary to portage around a fence or obstruction. Landowner permission is required to operate vehicles, such as all-terrain vehicles, along or in a stream.

URBAN FISHING PROGRAM WATERS

The Urban Fishing Program was created by the Commission in 1999 to



improve fishing in Nebraska’s urban areas.

The program focuses on city park and state

recreation area lakes

which are accessible to large numbers of urban residents, particularly children. Program activities include aquatic habitat improvement, fishing access development, fish stocking, fish population management, and family fishing clinics. Special fishing regulations will be used on some waters

to help improve their fisheries and angler catch rates. In general, these regulations will reduce or restrict harvest of certain game species. Populations of these species should subsequently increase and provide anglers with higher catch rate opportunities.

It is vital that anglers follow the restrictive harvest regulations as these small urban water bodies cannot handle high harvest and maintain good catch rates. Program waters should become favorite destinations for adults wishing to teach children how to fish. Special fishing regulations are being placed on the following waters. 



FISHING TACKLE LOANER PROGRAM

The Nebraska Game and Parks Commission fishing tackle loaner program continues to grow. The program is a combined effort of the Parks and Fisheries divisions. The Commission is hoping to introduce more Nebraskans to the fun of fishing by making fishing tackle available at 18 State Parks across the state. Spincast rod and reel combos, hooks, bobbers, weights and other tackle are available for park guests to use during their stay, at no charge. Would-be anglers of all ages may borrow the fishing tackle, but during periods of high demand, children are given priority. Anglers 16 years and older must have a current Nebraska fishing permit.

Anglers are asked to return the tackle promptly when finished fishing so others may use the equipment.

Anglers should not keep the tackle at their campsite for the duration of their visit. Some parks loan the tackle out of their main office, while others have their campground hosts loan the equipment. A few parks have bait you can use as well, but you may need to purchase your own bait or bring it with you.

TOURNAMENTS, CONTESTS AND DERBIES

Tournament Registration - All fishing tournaments, derbies or contests held on publicly owned, controlled or managed waters, that require an entry fee to participate, must be registered with the Commission's Fisheries Division at least 45 days prior to the event. Voluntary information on other tournaments, such as club tournaments, is also welcome. A Fishing Tournament Approval Certificate must be present at the tournament site. Your tournament date will be listed on the Nebraska Game and Parks web site.

Tournament Results - A "tournament results form" will be sent to the

tournament director. This form must be completed and returned to the Commission's Fisheries Division within 30 days following the completion of the fishing tournament. Failure to return the form or provide the requested information will result in denial of future fishing tournament requests for at least one year.

Tagged fish - The use of tagged or otherwise marked fish is prohibited in any fishing tournament, derby or contest that is held on (1) waters owned or controlled by the Game and Parks Commission and (2) waters stocked by the Game and Parks Commission during the preceding 24 months, excluding private lakes not owned by the state or other governmental entity.



TOXIC BLUE-GREEN ALGAE FACTS AND PRECAUTIONS

For the second consecutive summer, several public waterbodies have been placed under health alerts and closed to full body contact. This was due to high levels of the toxin, Microcystin, that resulted from high densities of certain species of blue-green algae or cyanobacteria. It is very important that water users understand the facts about blue-green algae and how to avoid health-related problems that can occur with exposure to their toxins.

Cyanobacteria, also known as blue-green algae, are single-celled aquatic organisms found in surface waters worldwide. They tend to thrive in stagnant and nutrient-rich (eutrophic) waters where high algal densities can create undesirable water quality conditions. The algal communities of eutrophic waters may contain representatives from three especially notorious, bloom-forming blue-green algae; *Anabaena*, *Aphanizomenon*, and *Microcystis*. Under certain conditions these algae are capable of producing toxins that can cause human and animal health problems ranging from skin irritation and gastrointestinal upset, to death from liver or respiratory failure.

Blue-green algal blooms typically occur during the months of July and August, but can occur at other times. During an intense algal bloom, the water can range from neon-green, pea-green, blue-green to reddish-brown. Blooms can impart a disagreeable odor and taste, and accumulate in bays or along shorelines producing an area of foam, scum or a thick mat.

On waterbodies with severe blue-green algal blooms, full-body contact and use by animals should be avoided. To help minimize potential health hazards, the following procedures are advised:

- Be aware of areas with severe blue-green algal blooms.
- Don't wade, swim, ski, tube or jet ski in waters containing severe visible blue-green algal blooms.

- If someone does come into contact with water with a severe blue-green algal bloom, it is advised that the person rinse off with clean water as soon as possible.

- It is most important to avoid ingestion of water containing high concentrations of blue-green algae as the digestive process releases the toxins present within the algae.

- Blue-green algal toxins have been shown to accumulate in the internal organs of fish; however, it doesn't appear to be present in fish tissue. Fish tissue samples were collected from fish in Nebraska reservoirs in 2005 with toxin analysis and results scheduled to be available in early 2006.

The likelihood of adverse symptoms as a result of exposure to blue-green algal toxins increases significantly with the duration of water contact and the density of the blue-green algal bloom. The severity of the illness appears to be directly related to the amount of water and algae ingested. Possible symptoms include: skin rash, mouth ulcers, ulcers inside of the nose, eye or ear irritations, blistering of the lips, sore throat, headaches, nausea, muscular pains, painful diarrhea, vomiting, central abdominal pain, seizures, liver failure and respiratory arrest.

A task force of members from the Nebraska Game and Parks Commission, Nebraska Department of Environmental Quality, University of Nebraska Water Center and the Department of Health and Human Services are gathering the information necessary to effectively address factors that trigger blue-green algal blooms and to develop the best management options for impacted waterbodies.

HELP PREVENT THE SPREAD OF EXOTIC AQUATIC NUISANCE SPECIES

Any waterborne, nonnative organism that threatens the diversity or abundance of native species, the ecological stability of impacted waters, or threatens a commercial, agricultural, aquacultural or recreational activity is an aquatic nuisance species.

These nuisance species have the potential to cause significant ecological problems because they have been introduced into habitat in which there are no natural pathogens, parasites or predators. Lack of these natural controls in new habitat may allow a nuisance species to grow at an exponential rate. If such nuisance species become established, they may disrupt ecological relationships in their new home. Introduced nuisance species may prey upon, or compete with native species, and they could transmit diseases to native species.

It is very important that anglers and boaters using the waters of Nebraska take precautions to prevent the introduction or spread of exotic nuisance species. This is especially important to boaters who travel to waters that currently have exotic nuisance species not present in Nebraska waters. Listed below are some procedures that should be followed:

- Inspect boat, trailer, and all boating equipment and remove any visible plant material and animals before leaving water access sites.
- Drain water from the livewell and bilge on land at the water access site. Never release live bait into any waterbody, or transfer and release any aquatic animal from one waterbody into another.
- Wash mud off all waders, since mud can carry various organisms, especially parasites, to a new watershed.

Zebra mussels can survive up to 2 weeks out of water, so after boating in infested waters and before transporting your boat either:

- rinse your boat and all equipment with hot tap water (over 104° F); or
- spray your boat and trailer with a high pressure sprayer. (The hot-water sprayers at car washes can be used); or
- dry your boat and all equipment for at least 5 days; and
- be sure to run the water out of the lower unit.

There are a multitude of exotic aquatic nuisance species that are of concern across the United States. The list of potential problem exotic species is long, but several species that are of immediate concern to Nebraska would be: zebra mussels, asian clams, eurasian water milfoil, curlyleaf pondweed, salt cedar (*Tamarisk*), purple loosestrife, bighead carp, silver carp, snakehead, *Daphnia lumhotzi* (zooplankton species) and rusty crayfish.



HOW TO MINIMIZE RISK BY CAREFULLY CLEANING YOUR FISH

Limited Consumption: Although fish consumption advisories have been issued for the water bodies listed here, please note that a person consuming an occasional meal of fish (less than one 8-ounce serving per week) from these waters is not considered to be subject to a significant health risk.



AQUATIC HABITAT WORK 2006

Bowling Lake (Lancaster County) - Design is finished and a contractor has been hired to begin construction. The first of two phases involves excavating approximately 100,000 cubic yards of material from the lake bottom.

Cunningham Reservoir (Douglas County) - Design and engineering has begun. This project has two phases, in-lake fish habitat enhancement and a structure above the lake to intercept sediment from the watershed.

Grove Lake (Antelope County) - Winter excavation is scheduled to remove vegetation and sediment down to the waterline after a three foot drawdown. Hydraulic dredging is again scheduled for 2006, with an estimated 20% of material still to be removed.

Harlan County Reservoir (Harlan County) - A small breakwater jetty is being designed to reduce sediment drift on the south side near Cedar Point. This design is 60% complete and, pending funding, construction may occur in 2006.

Sherman Reservoir (Sherman County) - A contractor has been hired and materials, primarily quarry rock, are being delivered to the reservoir. Construction is expected to begin before January 1, 2006, but may require up to three years to complete.

Walnut Grove Park Pond (Douglas County) - The City of Omaha Park and Recreation Department is designing this project.

CATCH AND RELEASE WORKS

Catch-and-release fishing only works when the fish you release survive. By using proper techniques, you give fish the best chance of survival. Here are a few guidelines:

- Do not play the fish to exhaustion.
- Wet hands and keep fish in water as much as possible when handling and removing the hook.
- Remove the hook gently. Do not squeeze the fish or put your fingers into the gills.
- Barbless hooks reduce handling time and make it simpler to remove the hook, often by backing it from the fish's mouth without lifting the fish from the water.
- Release the fish only after its equilibrium is maintained. If necessary, hold fish upright until it can swim away.
- Remove deeply imbedded hooks by use of a hemostat or hook removal tool if at all possible. This is presently considered the best method to increase chances of survival for deeply hooked fish.







If you make an outstanding catch, it may qualify for either a Game and Parks Commission State Record or a Master Angler Award. Application forms are available from any Commission office, conservation officer or permit vendor. Rules include:

STATE RECORD RULES

1. Fish **MUST** be caught in accordance with Nebraska Fishing Regulations by rod and reel (not set lines or limb lines), underwater spear-fishing, surface spearing, or archery and **MUST** be taken from Nebraska waters.
2. Fish **MUST** be weighed on an accredited or certified scale. A commercial measuring tape or stick should be used to measure the fish. The fish should be measured, from the tip of the mouth (closed) to the tip of the tail (tail lobes pressed together) with the fish laying flat on the tape.
3. Only fish that exceed current record by at least one ounce are eligible for a new State Record.
4. Two witnesses, one of which **MUST** be a permanent employee of the Nebraska Game and Parks Commission, must witness the weighing and measuring of the fish and sign the application.
5. The angler **MUST** display a Nebraska fishing permit to the Game and Parks employee that witnesses the weight.
6. One clear photograph showing a close-up side view of the fish, and one clear photograph showing the angler with the fish **MUST** accompany the completed application form. All photographs become the property of the Commission.
7. The species of fish **MUST** be verified by a Nebraska Game and Parks fisheries biologist. The fish **MUST** be preserved flat until species is verified.
8. The Commission reserves the right to collect fish scale, tissue or spine samples to check fish identification, and to refuse any questionable application submitted.
9. The Commission reserves the right to revoke state records if the record

holder is found in possession of illegal fishing gear or has been cited for repeated fishing violations that cast suspicion on the authenticity of the record catch.

10. No fish caught from any aquaculture or commercial put-and-take facility is eligible.
11. The application must be submitted within 30 days of the date the fish is caught.

MASTER ANGLER RULES

1. All fish must be taken from Nebraska waters.
2. If a fish is caught from private waters, a valid fishing permit is required to receive the award.
3. Fish must be taken by hook-and-line. Fish caught on banklines are not eligible. Fish must be legally hooked, played and landed by the applicant for the award.
4. The catch must be verified. This may be done by an employee of the Game and Parks Commission, a permit vendor, a witness or a photograph.
5. Anglers 16 years of age or older must possess a current Nebraska fishing permit and enter the permit number on the application.
6. Only fish immediately released are eligible for an award based on length. Any fish kept in a livewell or on a stringer must meet the minimum weight requirement to receive an award.
7. Anglers may receive only one award based on weight per year for each species. There is no limit on the number of catch-and-release awards.
8. Anglers who release a Master Angler fish will receive a "Catch and Release Master Angler" pin in addition to the Master Angler certificate.
9. Minimum weights must be met to qualify for a Master Angler Award for a harvested fish.
10. Minimum lengths are used strictly for Master Angler Awards for a fish that was caught and released.




PANHANDLE



Possession of fish not taken from refuge waters unlawful. No camping, electric motors only. Refuge open sunrise to sunset. Aquatic vegetation hampers summer fishing.

Willow Lake FWS -354 acres, 23½S, 3W of Valentine; Carp, pike, yellow perch; Northern pike - 28" maximum length limit. Possession of baitfish prohibited, dead smelt allowed. Possession of fish not taken from refuge waters unlawful. No camping, electric motors only. Refuge open sunrise to sunset. Aquatic vegetation hampers summer fishing.

Custer County

Arnold Lake SRA - 4 acres, ½S of Arnold, west side of Hwy. 40; Bluegill, channel catfish, largemouth bass; Dense aquatic vegetation in summer.

Thomas County

Bessey Fish Pond - 3 acres, 1W, 1/4S of Halsey - Bessey National Forest; Bluegill, rainbow trout in October, channel catfish, largemouth bass; No motorized boating, fish cleaning station, fishing pier.

Davis Creek Reservoir - 1,145 acres, 5S, 1E of North Loup; Bluegill, bullhead, carp, white bass, wiper, crappie, largemouth bass, walleye, yellow perch; Water level fluctuates dramatically due to irrigation.



Antelope County

Gavins Point Dam Tailwaters (Missouri River) - 1S, 4W of Yankton, SD; Buffalo, carp, channel and flathead catfish, white bass, crappie, drum, paddlefish, smallmouth bass, sauger, walleye, goldeye; Paddlefish - special regulations, check guide. All boats allowed, wheelchair-accessible fishing piers, access to Missouri River, From Gavins Point Dam to 0.6 miles downstream a nonresident Nebraska fishing license is required of anglers who are not residents of Nebraska or South Dakota when fishing from boat or either bank.



Southwest Nebraska offers large reservoirs, rivers, canals and smaller lakes for the enjoyment of anglers and campers. Anglers can try for many species, including channel catfish, bluegill, walleye, crappie, yellow perch and bass. Most areas have both modern and primitive camping facilities.





DROUGHT AND NEBRASKA RESERVOIRS

Will our reservoirs ever be full again? In recent years Nebraska anglers have seen the impacts low water levels are having on the fisheries in our reservoirs.

When water levels drop, it is inevitable that fish populations will be impacted. Fish need water! Some Nebraska reservoirs have reached levels as low as 20% of capacity. You can visualize the impact that has on fish communities by considering how many minnows can be kept alive in a 5-gallon bucket versus how many can be kept alive in a 1-gallon bucket.

Fish in water-depleted reservoirs become stressed. In the worse case, stress levels can be so severe that fish kills occur. Loss of habitat is a major impact as shallow water cover is left high and dry, and spawning habitats are reduced. Young fish that do hatch find minimal shallow cover in which to hide and feed. Reservoir fish populations are also depleted as fish exit the reservoir along with water that is released.

Temporary drawdowns can be beneficial when over-abundant prey fish are pulled out of shallow water cover making them more vulnerable to predation. Therefore, temporary drawdowns are a tool that fisheries managers can use to reduce prey

populations. However, severe, prolonged drawdowns will result in long-term declines in prey populations that feed larger sport fish.

Fishing in drought-depleted Nebraska reservoirs can be good as hungry, concentrated fish are easier to catch. It is probably a good thing when anglers take advantage of the good fishing and harvest some fish as those populations adjust to the diminishing habitat. However, fishing eventually will suffer. Ironically, poorer fishing likely will occur when water levels rise. As the water returns, fish populations will expand into ideal habitats, and anglers can expect fishing to be more difficult as depleted populations disperse into expanding areas of ideal habitat. Eventually fish populations and fishing will boom following refilling, but that could take several years.

For now we will have to live with low water levels in some Nebraska reservoirs. Water and how it is used will be an important issue in the coming years. Changes in policy and water law that may occur could be beneficial to fish & wildlife. There is no doubt that low water levels impact our fisheries and fishing, but with time and precipitation hopefully things will improve.



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
